The pair also achieved a near identical score in the medium 84, but were beaten by Pippa Fisher and San Pico on 72.57%.

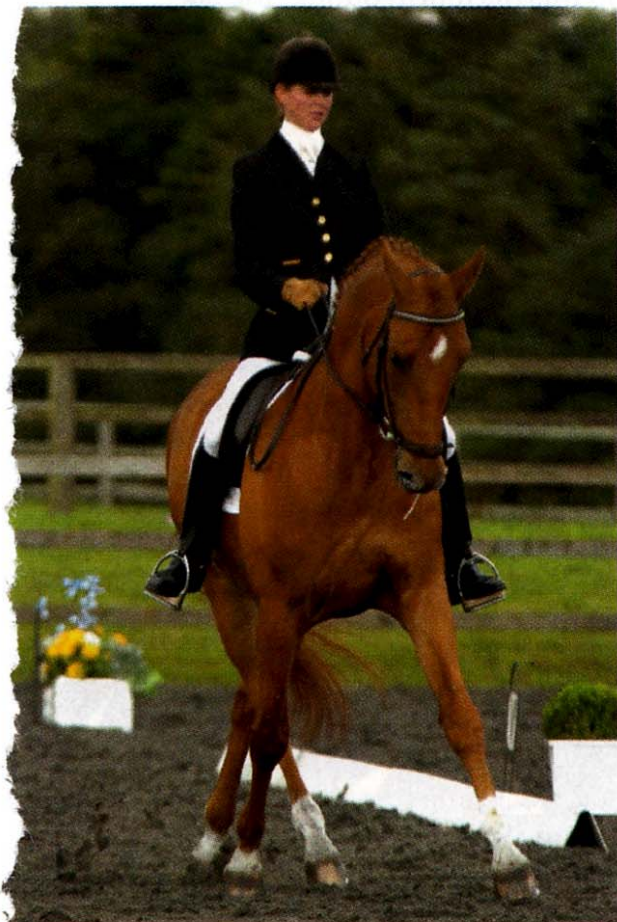
Henriette has owned the Lord Sinclair gelding for three years and said: "He's big-moving and probably the best horse I'll ever get, so I'm taking my time with him."

He did do a couple of PSGs last summer, but since then I've mostly concentrated on the training and we'll get some inter IIs in through the winter."

In the medium open, Lisa McLeod and her Dutch-bred gelding Oliver Twist X took the honours. Lisa, who trains with Joss Edwards, bought the horse after seeing him advertised in *Horse & Hound*.

"He'd done a bit of show jumping and dressage and we've gone on from there," she said.
